TODAY'S READING

Let us prepare ourselves for the Word of God. Our hearts and minds are open and we are eager to hear.

A READING OF Mark 14:37, 38

Then he returned to his disciples and found them sleeping. "Simon," he said to Peter, "are you asleep? Couldn't you keep watch for one hour? Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak." This is the Word of God and a witness of the people. Thanks be to God.

MESSAGE

Over the past 2,000 years there have undoubtedly, from every standpoint, been a plethora, (I don't get to use that word very often) of sermons and messages regarding the marvelous and very significant events of the last week of Jesus' life before the resurrection.

This morning I would like to do a quick review on a couple of my favorite events that happened in Jerusalem that week. As we go through these events we will end up with the message of which I believe God has laid on my heart.

Together, let's just take a look, as we touch on these events, at the human side of Jesus. We know that He was fully God, but He was also fully man. In His life on earth He would have experienced joy, sadness, pain, disappointment, emotional stress, tension, and all of the characteristics of a human being. He also was tempted in every way we as men are tempted, but in His case without sin. So let's think from a human standpoint how much He must have suffered.

The Triumphal Entrance

Early on Palm Sunday morning, Jesus and His disciples left Bethany where they had spent the night with His close friends, Lazarus, Mary and Martha. They walked toward Jerusalem which was about two miles from Bethany. Just before their arrival, Jesus sent two of His disciples on ahead to look for a donkey with its colt which had never been ridden. They were told to untie them and bring them to him. They did so and Jesus rode the young donkey in through the gates of the city... in the most humble way...a King of peace.

Had He come in on a horse, it would have been as a Triumphal warrior. This fulfilled the prophecy from Ezekiel 9:9 hundreds of years before this day. "Rejoice greatly O daughter of Zion! Shout, daughter of Jerusalem! See, your king comes to you, righteous and having salvation, gentle and riding on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The people cut palm branches and spread them along the road ahead of him. The multitude cried out saying: "Hosanna (adoration, praise and joy) unto the son of David! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the lord! Hosanna in the highest!"

Along the way, some of the Pharisees called to him from the crowd, "**Teacher, rebuke your disciples!**" But Jesus, with righteous indignation (my words) turned, and with the crowd noise in the background, shouted to them "I tell you that if these should keep silent, the very <u>stones</u> would immediately cry out!!"

Jesus Purges the Temple

The next day, Jesus went into the temple of God and found those that sold oxen and sheep and doves and the changers of money sitting there. Jesus immediately made a whip out of cords, and with much righteous indignation, He charged forward with whip flying and began picking up and tipping over the tables. Feathers flew as birds and animals began to squawk and shriek and money was scattered everywhere all over the floor. He undoubtedly shouted to them as He drove them out of the temple. **"It is written, that my house shall be called a house of prayer, but you have made it a den of thieves!!"**

Let's think about that a moment. Here's Jesus Christ with no fear. He was a strong young man in His prime at 33 yrs. Old. He walked all the time and was used to doing carpentry labor. He was undoubtedly physically fit, and at that moment, He was the opposite of happy, and **nobody** dared mess with him. As a Son, He purged the temple of His Father.

Further that week we see other well known scriptures of Jesus' last week before the cross

- A. Jesus' authority was questioned.
- B. Jesus is tested about tax payment.
- C. The scribes are confounded.
- D. Jesus talks about end times.
- E. Judas conspires to betray Jesus.

The Last Supper

"Now the feast of unleavened bread drew near, which was called Passover. And the chief priests and the scribes sought how they might kill him, for they feared the people". They were also looking for a way to cover their tracks.

That's when Satan entered Judas Iscariot, who at that point had somehow lost His focus on Jesus. He was one of the twelve that Jesus loved, taught and shared life with for three years.

Leaving the others He conferred with the high priests and the temple guards about how He might betray Jesus to them. They were happy and offered him 30 pieces of silver.

So, the day of unleavened bread came, the day the Passover lamb would be killed. Jesus tells Peter and John that "a man carrying a jar of water will show them a large upper room, and it would be furnished for their meal." There would have been facilities to prepare food, a table to seat 13 and cushions for them to recline on as they ate.

Jesus said, "With fervent desire, I have desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer." Of course Jesus knew what was about to happen. He was to be the Passover Lamb that would be slain as a sacrifice for our sins once and for all. He instructed them on the purpose of the bread and the cup and how it was to be taken in memory of him until the next time they would eat together in the kingdom of God.

After supper, Jesus stood up and laid aside His garments, took a towel and wrapped it around himself. Then He poured water into a basin and began to wash His disciple's dusty, dirty feet. He sat down again and said: "I have given you an example. So if I, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you must now wash each other's feet. What I've done...you do."

Every time I think about this scene, I think about Jesus' love for us. He knew when He began washing the feet of His disciples, that He would wash Judas's feet as well. Here's His trusted disciple who for three years shared life with Jesus. Judas saw Jesus lovingly heal many people; He observed the feeding of 5000 people with five loaves and two fish. He even saw Jesus raise people from the dead. At some point he must have

known that Jesus truly was the son of God. But it seemed at some point that in his heart He lost His focus on God and the devil took him over. To me, it was almost like when Jesus washed Judas's feet, He was symbolically washing the feet of His lifelong adversary Satan, whom He knew very well. He also knew that the devil was laughing.

Don't you feel that during this Easter season when Christians have always come together to worship and praise our risen Savior, that the enemy is laughing right now at our inability to physically come together as a body of believers all around the world. There is a Hebrew word called 'gumzalatova.' It means that 'what the devil plans for evil, God will turn it to good.' In Isaiah 59:19 God says, "When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the Spirit of the Lord shall raise up a standard against him."

This morning, my specific message that I believe God has laid on my heart, begins right now.

Could You Not Watch And Pray One Hour?

After the last supper, Jesus and His disciples made a short walk across the Kidron valley to the Garden of Gethsemane. They followed him in and He said to them, "Sit here while I pray."

Note: I don't recall any time mentioned in the scriptures where Jesus needed His disciples personally to pray with and for him. He had never needed them as He did right now. He took His three closest companions, Peter, James and John with him, and He began to be exceedingly troubled and deeply distressed. Then He said to them, "My soul is exceedingly sorrowful, even to death. Stay here and watch."

He went a little further, and fell on the ground, and prayed that if it were possible, this cup might pass from him. And He said, "Abba Daddy, all things are possible for you. Take this cup away."

Note: in the first part of this message I mentioned the fact that He was fully God, but He was also fully man. He felt exactly as we do when our bodies are injured or our minds are exceedingly troubled. Many of us, men and women can identify with these feelings and can almost imagine and understand His utter anguish and agony at that point, of knowing that unless His father would make another way for him, **He soon would be tortured to death!**

Note: most all of His life Jesus had been talking and sharing His deepest thoughts with His father. And He knew full well how much His father loved and cared for Him. Further He knew that God could do anything and He prayed that His father would take Him out of this.

Then Jesus came and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, "Simon, are you sleeping? Could you not watch one hour? Watch and pray lest you enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

"Again He went away and prayed, and spoke to His father the same words. And when He returned, He found them asleep again; for their eyes were heavy, and they did not know what to answer Him."

Then He came the third time and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and resting? It is enough. The hour has come; behold, the Son of man is being betrayed into the hands of sinners. Rise, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand."

Note: At that moment He grasps the full realization that this was His father's plan. He would be brought before the government, severely whipped, humiliated, spit upon, and nailed to a wooden cross and would hang there until He died. But, He was totally obedient, no matter what the outcome would be. His will now was to accomplish the plan and will of His Father.

Jesus knew the power of prayer and shared His feelings with His closest companions. It says that He began to be troubled and deeply distressed, and then He said to them, "My soul is exceedingly sorrowful, even to the death." I believe Jesus wanted and needed their prayers.

In recent Sunday messages I have been stressing that during this "time out" that has been forced upon us, we have a perfect opportunity to build unity and intimacy with our loved ones at home. Our lives are busy and sometimes hectic and we spend most of our days with our job families, our phone families, etc. and end up with relatively little quality time to share with God and our home family.

We have all heard the old adage that "the family that prays together, stays together." I believe that by praying together and keeping God at the center of our family life, our relationships can be changed for the better. Praying for and with each other is a powerful tool to build relationships, to restore relationships and also to improve our relationship with God. It can change the whole climate of our home.

Friends, how many times have we earnestly, fervently prayed for a wife, husband, or child that they could change for some reason. God can change them and He can change us. But, when we humbly come and sit together and pray, sing and praise God as a family and together ask for His help, we will sense His presence and begin to see a change for the good in our lives.

Jesus asked His disciples to watch and pray. Three times He looked for those three chosen ones to accompany him in prayer and found they had immediately gone to sleep. He was saying, stay by me, pray and watch with me. The man Jesus seemed to be needing human friendship and support at a time when He appeared to feel helpless. He was left awake and alone.

Knowing how important prayer is; how many times at night do we start out praying to God and in the middle of a sentence fall asleep, or our mind flies into some other realm? How many of us pray for 15 minutes straight? How many for 30 minutes; how many can come to God and pray for an hour? That was what Jesus wanted from His best friends in His time of need.

Today, if you are involved in this time of praying, worship and studying God's word, I challenge each of us to finish the service notes and either together or alone...stay in God's presence and pray on to at least complete one hour.

Our goal could be to go to our prayer closet every day and spend one hour with God. I believe our lives could be changed. There may be some reading this who are already meeting or surpassing this challenge. But for those of us who are not, I want us to listen

within our Spirit to hear God's voice speaking to Peter, "Could you not watch and pray with me for one hour?"
