


Friendship Guild meetings will resume on Saturday, August 14 10:00 a.m.

While it's possible to see the Perseids as early as 10 p.m. (in any time zone), the best viewing is during the pre-dawn hours. It is predicted that the greatest number of meteors will be seen on the mornings of Aug. 11, 12 and 13.

Mission Update from Paul/Jen Schafer July 18, 2021

Dear friends and family,

We thank you for your ongoing prayers and support for the Safaliba team, the translation, the literacy work, and the Safaliba's ministry outreach among their own people and those in the surrounding region.

We give great thanks that the team continues to be mostly healthy (no COVID so far) and are making good progress in translation, literacy, discipleship and church growth in the area.

Praise-- Last update we informed you all of the translators need for ongoing monthly support and also for help with their increased farming expenses (because of the lack of rain). Praise God with us -- two people have promised to help with some of the team's farming expenses, and just today we got a message from some supporters who will help some with the translators' general support need!

Translation

The last two weeks, Paul and the team have continued working on the read-through of the book of Matthew as well as the consistency and key terms checks. Please keep on praying for their internet to work well as they have still been having some problems with connectivity.

Also please keep praying for Nicholas's back which really hurts him whenever he rides his motorcycle and also pray for his diabetes and his wife's ongoing health issues.

In addition, please continue to pray for the translators and their farms. The rains this year have been very poor not only in the Safaliba area but across northern Ghana. This means that not only are the Safaliba's crops (next year's food) not growing well, but food in general is scarce and what is available is twice the usual price. Please pray for rain, for a good harvest, and for everyone to be able to get the food they need in the meantime.

Literacy

Daniel, Moses, Manjeed, Matilda, and Solomon are the 5 volunteer teachers who completed their 2-year basic teaching diploma last year (and are now half-way through an additional two years course to get a degree in teaching). This year, these 5 were assigned to do their 1-year "national service" in the Safaliba schools in Mandari, Gbenfu, and Nsunua. This "national service" includes a small monthly allowance from the government, and these 5 volunteers have proved faithful and used this extra financial freedom to put even more time and creativity into teaching the Safaliba children! They know that through your prayers and financial support, God has blessed them with the opportunity to get an education they would never have dreamed of, and enabled them to be a blessing to the children in their communities. When they started, they hardly knew how to begin to teach, and now they are doing so well!

Matilda has been asking for prayer. In addition to teaching in Mandari, we asked her to stay in our house and look after things while we're gone, and for several weeks some unknown persons have been giving her a very hard time, by putting magical objects in the yard to frighten her. She does not know why they are doing this -- but sometimes if a person seems to be stable and happy and having some success in education and life in general, people feel jealous and wish ill against them. Please pray for protection for Matilda.

Consultants-in Training

The translation consultants-in-training program (that Paul is in charge of) continues to go on well. They all continue to do Bible translation work in various parts of Ghana, and study and practice various tasks to prepare them for future consultant duties. Many of them are soon resuming their MA studies, some as early as the end of July and others in August. And all of them have reports due again by the end of this month (which Paul has to review, edit, and send off to their donors). Please continue to pray for this important training/ development program, for the consultants in training and for Paul as he helps them along their way to becoming translation consultants.

Family Health

As a family, we are all so thankful to have stayed healthy most of this year. (You may remember it was almost exactly a year ago that Josiah fell and broke his ankle and had to have a plate and pins put in.)

But we need your prayers on a couple of upcoming issues. Paul has been having nerve issues in his left arm over the last few years, but over the last 6 months it has become a bit debilitating, affecting his finger motions and strength, with a visible wasting of some of the hand muscles, and it's made it difficult for him to type quickly or accurately. So we went to our doctor, who sent us onto a neurologist for testing about six weeks ago, and then onto an orthopedic surgeon a couple weeks ago who said Paul needs to have surgery on his arm ASAP. So they have scheduled surgery for the 21st, this Wednesday. He will be in a sling for two weeks and then will have physical therapy after that. Please pray for the surgery and for the extra expenses.

Also, we need prayer for wisdom as Josiah may need to have the plate taken out of his ankle as it often bothers him. The doctor said this might happen and it might be necessary to remove it. Please pray for wisdom in this process.

Praises:

- --We thank God that Paul and the team continue to make progress and good corrections in the read-through of Matthew.
- --And we are thankful for the diligence of the teachers and volunteers and the good effect they are having on the schoolchildren.
- --We thank God for answered prayers and for more support for the translators (below see a picture of Pastor Sammy's church building in Gbenfu)
- --And we are thankful for the neurologist and orthopedic surgeon who have helped diagnose Paul's arm problems.
- --Also, we are thankful for good health for all of us as a family, and for God's provision and care over so many years with Wycliffe. (Below, see a picture of all 6 of us at the memorial commemorating Wycliffe's founding in 1934.)

Prayer Requests:

- --Please continue to pray for the translation, for the ongoing read-through and consistency checks for the New Testament, for good internet and for wisdom as to how to keep on making good progress, even after Paul's surgery.
- --And pray for wisdom and strength for Paul as he also juggles the consultants-in-training and tries to help get their quarterly reports finished up very soon.
- --Please continue to keep Nicholas in your prayers as well, for his health, his back issues, his wife's health and all that he juggles.
- --Pray for the literacy teachers and volunteers, for their health and continued diligence as well as wisdom for them as they teach their students, and especially for Matilda.
- --Also, please pray for rain for all the farmers in the Bole area, but especially for the Safaliba translators and literacy teachers, whose families depend a lot on being able to grow and harvest their yearly crops.
- --And lastly, pray for Paul's surgery on the nerves in his left arm this Wednesday and for the healing and physical therapy afterwards.

Thank you to each of you who prays, encourages, and supports us and our colleagues in Ghana! It takes all of us. We appreciate you all.




